"SEASON OPENING WILL BE MURDER:"



The Stone Arch Players will open their 2008-2009 season at the Theatre In The Park with the classic 1940's romantic murder mystery LAURA. Several times made into a motion picture--most famously with Gene Tierney--the play concerns the aftermath of the brutal shotgun murder of a beautiful New York City socialite, Laura Hunt. Her closest friends and associates gather in her apartment along with the police inspector to solve both the puzzle of Laura's death--and the mystery of her life.

Director Thiry Olbrich has assembled an all star cast of actors for this first production of the year, headed by Abby Hunley. Seen most recently as Sabrina Fairchild in last season's SABRINA

FAIR, Hunley has been a fixture at SAP for many years. She has starred in BELL, BOOK AND CANDLE, I HATE HAMLET, OVER THE RIVER AND THROUGHTHE WOODS, and most hilariously as Honey Pie Burgermeister, a Tammy Faye Bakker clone, in THE SENATOR WORE PANTYHOSE. Costarring as Detective Mark McPherson is Christopher Brannen, who recently appeared in TO KILLA MOCKINGBIRD at the Boal Barn. Also direct from the summer season at the Boal Barn is Melissa Alfonsi Rohan who last appeared in SCCT's BELL, BOOK, AND CANDLE, and was introduced to our audiences, along with Brannen, in last year's SABRINA FAIR. Eric Kress plays Danny Dorgan, the college boy obsessed with Laura. Eric debuted with us in 2001's CLIFFHANGER, in which he played one of several villains. Barb Stahl, most recently seen in spring's GOD'S FAVORITE, plays Danny's overprotective mother, Mrs. Dorgan. In a surprise casting choice, Paul Olbrich has been chosen to play Olsen, a policeman. Husband of our group's president, First Gentleman Paul is usually seen backstage running the footlights, rather than in front of them. Rounding out the cast are two veteran SAP warhorses: Ron Patterson as Laura's fickle fiancee Shelby, and Bill Daup as her patronizing mentor Waldo Lydecker. Both have been with the group since the 1980s.

LAURA promises a night of classic theatrical mystery. Director Olbrich is assisted by stage manager Sandy Hunley and founder Ann McNabb, dressing the set. Tickets go on sale to the general public November third. Evening performances will be presented November 7, 8, 14, 15, 21, and 22. Sunday matinees will be held on November 16 and 23. Join us for this shivery tale of murder and madness.

DINNER HONORS BROADWAY'S "HAL PRINCE"

Thiry and Paul Olbrich were guests at a special dinner October 12th at Susquehanna University, honoring the American theatrical producer and director Hal Prince. Harold Smith Prince has been associated with many of the best known Broadway musicals, including PAJAMA GAME, WEST SIDE STORY, and COMPANY, and is the recipient of 21 Tony awards--more than any other individual. He is the Dr. Bruce Nary visiting theatre artist at Susquehanna, and offered the lecture THE HISTORY AND FUTURE OF THE BROADWAY MUSICAL following the dinner. President of Susquehanna University and wife, Jay and Marsha Lemons were hosts of the affair at their home on University Drive, and the lecture followed in the Degenstein Center Theater.

Both Olbrichs are graduates of Susquehanna University, where they met on the stage of the theater, during a production. Thiry also notes that the first Broadway play she ever saw was PAJAMA GAME, a Hal Prince production.
