
Pat joined the Stone Arch Players for their first production in 1967, THE MOUSE THAT ROARED. She said her duties included doing makeup and chauffeuring three devilish teenaged boys to and from rehearsals. Laughingly, she reveals that one of the "devils" was recently returned member Mike Knarr. Bob joined the group as an actor with our second play THE HEIRESS. Pat says that she and Bob performed together on stage at least once, but quickly decided that her lack of acting talent made paying a baby-sitter a waste, and Bob became the sole actor in the family. Pat continued to do makeup for the group off and on through the ensuing years as Bob racked up an impressive list of acting and directing credits including WAIT UNTIL DARK, THE ODD COUPLE, and the recent THE RAIN-MAKER. In February of 1985, son Matt made his only appearance with SAP in our children's play THE PRINCE WHO WOULDN'T TALK as the title character, with his father playing his father, the king.

Bob is a retiree from Standard Steel and Pat was owner of the upscale gift shop THE HUMMINGBIRD for many years. They will be greatly missed in our theater and in our community. Pat regrets that "everything happening so fast" made it impossible to say good-bye to all their friends, and hopes that people will contact them in their new home.
